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GSM announces 2013 season

Audiences will find themselves dancing in the streets and humming the memorable songs after seeing the shows produced by the Garland Summer Musicals.

The 2013 season will feature the beloved musical comedy "Singin' in the Rain" in June. Opening in July will be the rollicking "9 to 5 The Musical"

Both musicals will be under the helm of former Broadway director/choreographer/performer and Wylie resident Buff Shurr who is returning for his 30th season.

Patty Granville is the producer of the Garland Summer Musicals. Granville has been the director of the Garland Center for the Performing Arts since its opening in 1982. She is a well-known, accomplished stage and television performer. In 2003 the Garland City Council renamed the Garland Arts Center the Patty Granville Arts Center in her honor.

Joe Murdock is master carpenter for the musicals. He is the technical theater director at Sachse High School. He said a lot of the technical crew for both shows will be comprised of SHS students.

'There's no people like show people'

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"Producing a musical of the caliber of our productions taken on incredible amount of time, work and dedication," Granville said. "Actually the process is almost ongoing as our board of directors are already discussing shows for 2014,"

"Singin" in the Rain" gives a comic view of Hollywood as it transitions from silent film to "talkies."

Granville describes the leading man, Don Lockwood, as a popular silent film star with humble roots as a singer, denore and stantman. "He barely tolerates his vapid, shallow leading lady, Lina Lamont, though their stadio. Monumental Pictures, links them romantically to increase their popularity," she said. "When talking pictures and a young actress enter the scene, it beings new opportunities for a carner and love."

The stage version of the musical was adapted from the farnous 1952 movie starting Gene Kelly, Donald O'Cronner and Debbie Reynolds, with a book by Betty Cornden and Adolph Green, lyrica by Auture Posed and music by Nacro-Hert Brown. The score includes the classics "Good Morning," "Make "en Laugh," "Moses Supposes" and "Singin" in the Rain."

Grandle promoes that the

fursous dencing scene in the man will feature real rain coning down on the actors as they dance up and down the rainscaled street.

"9 to 5: The Musical" is a kilarious story of franching and nevenge. The show is based on the hit movie and features Dolly Parton's original hit title song along with her Tony Award- and Granuny-nominated score. The book is by Patricia Rusnick. The show tells the story of three unitiely friends who conspire to take control of their company and learn there's nothing they can't do — even in a man's world.

Reviews of the show call it "an outrageous, hilarious, thought-provoking tale of teaming up and taking core of butiness."

Oranville said GSM conducted surveys with the audiences from last surmer's performances, the GSM board of directors and the GSM Guild.

"From those surveys, "Singar" in the Rain' and "9 to 5: The Musical' emerged in the top choices," she said. "It is very, very important for OSM shows to feature a lot of duncing and be popular musicals with our audience. Ticket sales make up two thirds of our hudget to we have to pick shows that will sell well."

Graville and the advance taket sales have been excellent for the season.

"We always have the GSM board of directors very averled in the show telection," she said. "We have several meetings where we discuss possible shows and give them a chance to capress their feelings about various productions."

Oranville bragged that the GSM technical staff "to one of the finest anywhere."

"They are all professionals who stay very busy in the Ilullas-Fort Worth area," she said. "They are part of our wondertial GSM family. Of course Buff Shurr has been with as since the inception of the Garberd Summer Musicals, and of course Master Carpenter Ion Mardock did his first production with GSM in 1999 as an intern from Tarleton State and has been with GSM ever since."

Grandille said this your staff is very excited to have Scott Ealert seture as a musical directer for "9 to 5. The Musical."

"Sout was with GSM for many years during the 1990s," she said. "Mark Mullino is returning as musical director for "Singin" in the Rain." Mark is also very active in Dullas and is the director of the DYA-GSM Summer Camp Productions. Joseph Jones and Kelly Mc-Cain have been performing and chorcographing with GSM for many sensons. Kelly Cox our scenic designer has been with GSM for the past ten seasons. Michael Robinson with Dullas Custome Shoppe has been associated with GSM since 1986.

"Lighting Designer Susan White has been with us for 11 seasons. Prop Designer Lyan Mauldin first started working with GSM in 1992."

Granville said she believes that the Dallas-Fort Worth area has one of the best talent pools in the country; that is why so many casting directors for films and musicula come to Dallas, alse noted.

Audition dates are April 6 and 7. Staff is looking for performers who have a strong background in dance and vocal performance. Age is not always a factor. Experience is very important factor.

All performances are held in the runin auditorium of the Granelle Arm Center, 300 North Piffs St. in downtown Garland, Tickers are available at the Arts Center Box Office or by calling 972-205-2790.
